DESCRIPTION OF THE HONORS PROGRAM (Spring, 2025)

The honors program is a two-course sequence (PSY 495, PSY 496) to which you apply in the spring of your junior year (Spring 2025) and can begin in the fall of your senior year (Fall 2025) and complete in the spring of your senior year (Spring 2026). **Applying to the honors program requires having a faculty person in Psychology agree to mentor you through your completion of your project.** Accordingly, preparing to apply to do an honors project requires getting involved in research earlier in your time here at Stony Brook, usually by completing PSY 273 with a faculty mentor in your sophomore and/or junior year. In that way, you can develop research skills, a mentorship relation with a faculty mentor, and an idea for an independent project to be carried out under the supervision of the faculty person who recommends that you be admitted to the program.

The main goal of the program is to provide you an opportunity to develop and complete a research project under the supervision of a faculty member. Other goals of the program are to help you sharpen your skills in writing about and/or orally presenting research findings, which can help prepare you for graduate school in psychology.

Your capstone accomplishment will take the form of a fully realized empirical project, the methods, results, and conclusions or a literature review which you report in the form of (a) a presentation at a conference and/or (b) an approximately 20-page paper written in the style of the American Psychological Association (APA). Whether the final form of your project is an APA-style paper or a conference presentation, or both, is to be agreed upon by the mentor.

TIMELINE

Before applying at the end of the spring semester of your junior year, you will need to have:

- a. Established a working relationship with one of the participating faculty.
- b. Settled on a research question that you will be able to answer in a one-year project. (This can be a portion of a larger project planned or underway by that faculty member.)
- c. Written and submitted a 250-word abstract of your planned project (as part of this application).
- d. Asked a faculty member to submit a letter of recommendation (as part of this application).

Specific Goals of PSY 495 (Fall Semester 2025):

By the end of your first full semester as an honors student, you should realize substantial progress on your project. By the end of the semester, you will:

- Survey the scientific literature relevant to your project.
- Settle with your mentor the final form of your project (conference presentation and/or APAstyle manuscript).
- Begin data collection (if collecting new data) and/or begin data cleaning/data analysis (if using data that already exist), or literature retrieval.
- If planning for a conference presentation, become aware of **conference-submission deadlines** and work with your mentor to meet those deadlines (the Stony Brook-internal URECA deadline generally is in the spring).
- If planning an APA style manuscript, you should complete your **Introduction** and **Methods** sections by the end of this semester.

The Undergraduate Director will submit a letter grade for PSY 495 (it is one credit) based your progress in meeting the above objectives, as communicated by your mentor and/or as assessed directly through a minimum of one meeting (individual or group) per semester with each honors student.

Specific Goals of PSY 496 (Spring 2026):

By the end of your final semester as an honors student, you will have

- Completed data/literature collection and analysis for your honors project.
- Interpreted your results in light of your understanding of the scientific literature.
- If completing an APA-style manuscript, completed the literature review or the Abstract, Results,
 Discussion, and Reference sections for an empirical paper (and further revised the Introduction
 and Methods sections that you wrote in the fall), culminating in an approximately 20-page APAstyle manuscript suitable for submission to a peer-reviewed journal.
- If completing a conference presentation, presented your work at a conference, where you knowledgably answer questions about your project.

The Undergraduate Director will submit a letter grade for PSY 496 (it is one credit) based your progress in meeting the above objectives, as communicated by your mentor and/or as assessed directly through a minimum of one meeting (individual or group) per semester with each honors student.

ELIGILIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR THE HONORS PROGRAM:

- 1. Have a faculty mentor who has agreed to supervise your project (please see above description).
- 2. Be a 2nd semester JUNIOR Psychology major when applying (two weeks before the end of the Spring Semester 2024).
- 3. Have an overall GPA of 3.2 and a GPA of 3.5 in Psychology.
- 4. You should have already **COMPLETED the following courses:**

INTRODUCTION TO PSYCHOLOGY (PSY 103)
STATISTICAL METHODS IN PSYCHOLOGY (PSY 201 or approved equivalent)

APPLYING: Applications are **DUE Friday**, **April 18**th, **2025** and must include:

- 1. Application Form (see below)
- 2. A copy of your transcript (unofficial copies are acceptable).
- A letter of recommendation from a faculty member in Psychology who has agreed to be your mentor for your honors project. Please ask your recommender to state in the letter (a) an agreement to be your mentor and (b) that the mentor has read an approved of your 250-word abstract that you are submitting in this application. Be sure to request that the recommendation be submitted to the Undergraduate Director, Dr. Anne Moyer, (anne.moyer@stonybrook.edu) PRIOR TO the deadline of Friday, April 18th, 2025

Late or incomplete applications cannot be considered.

NOTIFICATION: You will be notified about the status of your application around May 2, 2025.
